Next season, you will be taking your talents to Bonnyville, where you will spend the season playing junior hockey for the Pontiacs in pursuit of your goal of playing Division I hockey. As the reigning champ of Canadian Trivia, you are one of only four people on campus who actually know where Bonnyville is. Bonnyville, Alberta, will be lucky to have you! They are getting a phenomenal player and an even better young man.
